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### Slowly but surely, getting better ...

This newsletter brings details and booking forms for 3 Visits, 3 Lectures, a Walk and an Afternoon Tea in our Autumn Programme alongside 2 Group Holidays for 2023. We are delighted to report a steady increase in our membership numbers as 2022 unfolds and that we have, together, so far enjoyed successful visits to heritage estates and gardens, a lunch with our President and a garden tour with afternoon tea at an Oxford college alongside several guided walks on local Trust estates.

We extend a very warm welcome to **Pam Lee**, a member since 2013, who has joined Committee in the role of **Holidays Co-ordinator**, working closely with friends and allies **Plastow's Travel** and **Airedale Tours**, their booking agent. This highly effective collaboration has enabled us to re-introduce Group Holidays to members. A similar, most welcome association with **Guy Rogers**, Oxford Centre's Auditor, made it possible for bookings and ticketing in Summer to proceed when **Ticket Secretary Rupert McNeile** was suddenly unavailable. Rupert and Guy are now a team of two – a third person is actively sought. Additionally, **Ashley Castelino** kindly took on the role of **Website Manager** earlier in the year and is both very helpful and highly competent – a reminder that his regular updates to <http://oxfordcnt.co.uk/> bring you all the information you might need, on screen.

Regular readers will know that page 8 of the newsletter always lists everyone involved in organising all that we can offer. For the very first time, Executive Committee is outnumbered by our **Friends & Supporters** who kindly offer their time and talents in different ways. We couldn't manage without them and hope to attract more by the end of the year to further share the workload.

We have designated 2022 our '**Year of Recovery**', working out how a smaller Committee can still arrange visits, events and manage Oxford Centre's affairs. Venues are themselves 'in recovery' from the ravages of Covid and often struggling. Whilst we are all doing rather well, Committee struggles with no Membership Secretary in place (that 'gap' jointly covered by Treasurer & Chair pro tem) and no-one to help with Publicity which is why our literature is not on public display in local libraries, or anywhere else – more 'gaps'! We're doing all we can to fill these roles: **Membership Sec** as a Committee role, **Publicity** easily covered by a small team of 2-3 perhaps, working in their own time as Friends & Supporters?

## New Courses



The Coleshill team is working hard to develop its new and unique Heritage & Rural Skills Centre. The aim is to address the decline in specialist building skills and rural crafts (putting heritage properties at risk) by offering a range of courses in a partnership between the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and the National Trust.

The focus will always be on promoting and giving an introduction to estate-related endangered skills alongside other creative skills including Weaving, Printmaking and Fabric Dyeing.

## Changing Spaces

The Cart Horse Stables, the new lecture/event/exhibition room is revealing itself. It was partly converted to a house in the 1970s/80s so sadly some historic interior may have been lost, but we have kept what we could, including the old kicking boards.

Following planning permission being granted for car parking in 2021 work commences in September to create space to welcome visitors and course students to the centre and parkland.

We are also clearing long held building stock from areas of the home farm to make room for the expansion of our lime plaster training bays – and a newly designated space for collection items that have been unearthed and sorted. We hope to get plenty of this collection on display in new exhibition spaces in 2023.

## Bookings & Ticketing, what's changed, why?

Back in May, 2021, Government regulations were eased around the gradual relaxation of COVID-related lockdown. We saw a window of opportunity to take a small party of just 25 members out for coffee and cakes to the Carpenters Yard Café on the beautiful Coleshill & Buscot Estate. Whilst there we viewed the site of our sponsored planting scheme at Middleleaze Paddock. We were rigorous in complying with the rules: personalised tickets, controlled boarding and disembarking with allocated, distanced seating in a Plastow's coach (thoroughly sanitised); identical, distanced seating allocated in the café; everyone wore face masks and we all delighted in each other's congenial company and delicious cakes!

Since then we have continued to manage our own ticketing, as the rules relaxed with face masks now a matter of personal choice. And members have been increasingly supportive of the visits and events we've been able to arrange, which is wonderful. Thank you. However, the sheer volume of tickets we now issue makes it no longer practicable to produce our own. That's why Ticket Secretaries Rupert McNeile & Guy Rogers are, as of now, reverting to pre-printed and standardised tickets. What does this mean to you, when you apply?

- ✓ As usual, complete and submit your Booking Form **but by post** (and no longer by email) to the nominated Ticket Secretary **enclosing a stamped addressed envelope**
- ✓ As usual, make your payment by **enclosing a cheque** with your Booking Form OR **by bank transfer** if you prefer (this is certainly easier for us)
- ✓ **Be an early bird?** Please submit your Booking Form as soon as you possibly can, to help the organisers with essential planning – after all, your booking fee is fully refundable up to the published booking deadline, should you need to cancel
- ✓ Once you receive your ticket/s, please **contact the Visit Leader** (full details on each ticket) with any queries

From now on, all pre-printed tickets will be posted out (as was the case in pre-Covid days). This should be seamless for you as a member and significantly reduces our workload.

**Waiting Lists?** We should clarify, for the avoidance of all doubt, that where we have a Waiting List, such places are allocated **only once all applications are received at the booking deadline, not before.** You must submit your Booking Form, with payment, to be on a Waiting List. Your payment will be promptly refunded if we're unable to offer you a place. It's ALWAYS worth applying – inevitably, sometimes last-minute, there are cancellations.

### News from the Walking Group

The final walk in this year's series will be based at Chastleton; and will take place on Wednesday, 21 September. We hope to offer monthly walks again next year, from April to September. Each will be based on a National Trust house, or National Trust farmland, within easy reach of Oxford. ## VISITS & EVENTS, OCTOBER– NOVEMBER 2022

### Thursday, 29 September: HAMPTON COURT PALACE

This will be a great opportunity to discover the magnificence of this former royal residence, once home to the flamboyant King Henry VIII. You can marvel at the two distinct and contrasting Tudor and Baroque architectural styles and soak up the atmosphere in 60 acres of stunning gardens beside the River Thames. Extended and developed in grand style in the 1520s by Henry VIII, the present day elegance and romance of the palace owes much to the Christopher Wren designed baroque buildings commissioned by William and Mary at the end of the 17<sup>th</sup> century. The building is split into sections each telling a story of a different period of history so you can choose which sections to visit. There are individual electronic guides to tell you all about your surroundings. Highlights include the magnificent Great Hall, the stunning vaulted ceiling of the Chapel Royal and the enormous kitchens, which are the most extensive surviving 16<sup>th</sup>-century kitchens in Europe. The formal gardens are continually being developed and include the 18<sup>th</sup>-century Privy Garden and the world famous maze.

There are places to buy refreshments including a licensed restaurant.

**Accessibility:** It is likely that there will be a good deal of walking as the coach can only park on Hampton Green, which is a 15 minute walk from the palace so this visit is not recommended if you cannot manage that distance.

### Thursday, 13 October: COLESHILL & BUSCOT ESTATE, sampling “Hands on History”

This rural estate lies on the West Oxfordshire border, comprising two very English villages and 11 traditionally farmed estates spanning 7,000 acres. We'll arrive in time for coffee and biscuits (incl in your ticket price) in the Timber Store, our base for the day (toilets just opposite). Then we'll divide into 2 groups *either* on a talking tour led by **General Manager, Christian Walker** to see the new Heritage Skills spaces, dropping in on **Tom Ball**, a stone and wood carver at work, *or* for a live demonstration by local blacksmith, **Dave Cobalt**.

**Lunch in the Timber Store:** Carpenters' Yard Café serves delicious sandwiches or light lunches – all dietary options covered – alongside various hot and cold drinks. *We need to pre-order within 2 weeks of our visit.* Early in September, I'll contact all those who have booked with the latest menus and how to pre-order and pay, unless you prefer to bring your own picnic.

After lunch, we regroup for *either* the talking tour *or* the blacksmith's demo. Between 3 and 4 pm we return to the Timber Store to meet with **Countryside Manager, Richard Watson**, for a short presentation on the restoration of the Parkland area, followed by own time to take a stroll or to relax with a cup of tea and a cake. Weather conditions may make conditions slippery, so suitable footwear is advised (and waterproof clothing). Coach departs at 4.15 (to reach Oxford by 5.15 pm).

**Accessibility** The walk from the Timber Store is downhill slightly on tarmac, some areas of gravel, concrete (some slightly sloped or cracked areas) and some cobbles – uneven in places. These will be pointed out as you walk the site. Gradual incline back to the Timber Store.

There’s a theme of conservation and preservation within the National Trust in many of our lectures this season.

**Tuesday 18 October, 11am at Magdalen Auditorium: Peeling back the layers, the art of conserving paintings**



This lecture will be given by **Rebecca Hellen**, Specialist Advisor for Paintings at the National Trust, who will describe the Trust’s new in-house studio on the Knole estate in Kent. She will shine a light on how the technical analysis of paintings informs the way we devise conservation treatments and helps art historians and curators understand and interpret these works.

**14 to 20 November via Zoom: Greys Court through the Ages**

**April Thompson**, experienced volunteer at Greys Court, explores the varied history of Greys Court, from William the Conqueror to the present. This includes an Archbishop, a soldier whom no one can trace, connections with Elizabeth I, a governor of the Leeward Isles, revelry, a widow who bought Greys Court as a weekend retreat, and finally the Brunners, who turned the house into their family home. **Tuesday 13 December, 11am at Magdalen Auditorium: Insects – the Canary in the Collections-care Coalmine?**



**Hilary Jarvis**, Assistant National Conservator at the National Trust leading on Integrated Pest Management for Collections, describes how they monitor pests in National Trust houses, which species are of most concern, what their varying levels can reveal and **why** it’s so important to take full advantage of this.

## Holiday in Grantham, 2022

Our first stop on the way there was **Calke Abbey** – a place which had been left as it was when the Trust took it over. I think most people do not wish to see another glass case filled with stuffed animals and birds or stags' head on the walls. The State Bed was found in cardboard boxes and then assembled by the Trust. The 18<sup>th</sup>-century Chinese silk bed hangings are very vibrant.

The next venue was the home of the Curzon family at **Kedleston Hall**. Such a contrast, as it was so well kept. The Robert Adam house, with vibrant blue and gold-leaf furniture, was beautiful. We met up with the lady who was dressed up as Mrs Garnett, housekeeper during the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries, who was so fascinating to speak to. After a long journey on Wednesday, we reached Gunby Hall, a smaller family home. The last member of the Massingberd family founded the Pioneer Club in Kensington for ladies only. The pianist in the Music Room was very accomplished. The extensive gardens were superb – and the dovecote had doves in it. We

visited Tattershall Castle on the way back to the hotel.

On the way home we visited Packwood – a fascinating house with items collected by Graham Baron Ash. The gardens and yew trees are always spectacular.

A huge vote of thanks must go to our coach driver and leader, Diane, who was an excellent driver and dealt with all problems with efficiency and great sense of humour.
