## Lecture at Magdalen Auditorium on 21 March, after AGM

The title given by **Rebekah Hodgkinson** to her lecture is "**Colonial Photographic Collections at the National Trust**". She has been doing research for a DPhil in Archaeology at the University of Oxford in collaboration with the National Trust, which involves digging through photographic archives and historical records rather than digging up buried treasures!

A case study for her research is Lord George Curzon, Viceroy of India from 1899 to 1905, whose family seat was Kedleston Hall, and who also purchased Bodiam Castle and Tattershall Castle and left them to the National Trust in his will. In India, he reformed the British Government's existing practices regarding archaeological surveys and the conservation of monuments. Most famously, he oversaw restorations at the Taj Mahal. Rebekah will show us ornate albums of photos relating to his time in India and explain her thesis exploring how the National Trust has been shaped by imperialism at different moments in its history.

**2022 was a challenging year** for the OCNT finances, as the number of members going on outings was reduced, as were attendances at lectures at Magdalen Auditorium. We rely on making a small surplus on all our activities which is then donated at the end of the year to local NT properties. We dug a little into our reserves to make the following donations in December 2022:

To Greys Court, towards a natural play area £750;

and to Hughenden's general donation fund £750.

We were very grateful to all members who supported our lecture programme with donations to the **Zoom lectures**, which totalled £425. The **200 Club** last year took in £700, with prizes totalling £330 given out to winning shareholders. This year, we have received £755 for the 200 Club, so many thanks to everyone who has bought shares. Draws will take place February, March, October, November and December (the January draw has already happened). It's not too late to contribute and have your share numbers entered in the forthcoming draws! The surplus after prizes are deducted goes into our donation at the end of the year to the National Trust.

## VISITS MAY TO JULY 2023

#### Wednesday, 10 May 2023: DUAL VISIT TO THE ROMAN COTSWOLDS INCLUDING CORINIUM **MUSEUM, CIRENCESTER AND NATIONAL TRUST CHEDWORTH VILLA**

Nearly 2,000 years ago, the Romans settled in the Cotswolds and Cirencester became the second city in Roman Britain. Many Roman villas have been discovered in this area, Chedworth is the most significant. This day trip offers an opportunity to know more about this fascinating local Romano British civilisation.

The day is organised into two parts: we arrive at around 11:00 at the Corinium Museum, in **Cirencester**, starting the visit with a short introduction by one of the museum staff, to help orientate you around this splendidly refurbished museum. You will be offered a tea or coffee and biscuits on arrival (your entrance fee, the lecture and refreshments are included in the overall cost of the trip). You will then be given time to go around the museum with all its fascinating displays, giving insight into the daily lives of the Roman-British culture which lasted for 400 years. You can find lunch either in the museum café or in Cirencester town centre. We will depart from Cirencester by 13:45.

We plan to arrive at Chedworth Villa around 14:15, for a guided tour through the recently refurbished buildings which house the mosaics, and remains of the main part of the villa. There is a small cafe for drinks and snacks or just to relax. You're free to wander the ruins and admire the lovely surrounding countryside. We will depart at 16:00 returning to Oxford around 17:30.

Thursday, 8 June, 11am – 4 pm: Delapré Abbey and Parkland (Northampton), a Grade II LISTED HERITAGE BUILDING



Delapré Abbey on the outskirts of Northampton, was built in 1145 as a Cluniac nunnery – the Abbey of St Mary de la Pré. Today's beautiful walled garden is thought to be the nuns' burial ground. In 1290, the Abbey hosted the funeral cortege of **Queen Eleanor** and we will pass Northampton's commemorative Eleanor Cross – one of only three to survive today. Delapré Abbey surrendered to the crown as part of the **Dissolution of the Monasteries** in 1538, then changed hands sequentially becoming a family residence.

More recently, it saw World War II service, remaining a privately owned home until the death of Mary Bouverie, the last direct descendant of that family, in 1943. Typically Victorian 19C additions to the grounds survive and can be enjoyed today. Following decades of neglect and disrepair, Heritage Lottery Funding facilitated an ambitious £6.3 million restoration plan: today, **Delapré Park** offers open access to all across 500 acres of formal gardens, a lake, extensive woodland walkways, and much more.

Accessibility: We'll have tea/coffee and biscuits on arrival prior to a 90 minute guided tour of the Abbey in small groups for an "immersive" experience, with seating, lifts or shallow steps. In the park, walkways are mostly level although wooded areas can be uneven, with some steps. The Orangery café (*nb: card purchases only*) has a terraced area with outside seating or picnic elsewhere in the grounds.

## Tuesday, 27 June 2023, 2pm: GUIDED TOUR OF OXFORD BOTANIC GARDEN

Members of Oxford Centre are fortunate to have been invited on a Guided Tour of the Oxford Botanic Garden by Professor Simon Hiscock, the Director. He will be assisted on the day by the Deputy Director, Dr Chris Thorogood, and Curator, Mark Brent, so that numbers can be more easily managed. As well as being Director of the Botanic Garden and Arboretum, Simon Hiscock is Professor of Botany in the Department of Plant Sciences at Oxford University.



Professor Hiscock recently gave us a lecture via Zoom celebrating the Garden's 400th anniversary. "Oxford Botanic Garden is the oldest botanic garden in Britain and one of the oldest in the world. Founded in 1621 as a physic garden for teaching medical students how to identify plants used in herbal medicines, it is the birthplace of the botanical sciences at Oxford. Today it is an important centre of botanical research and teaching, plant conservation and public engagement. Looking to the future, exciting plans have been developed for state-of-the-art new glasshouses and new facilities for research and teaching, as the Botanic Garden moves confidently into its next century, an era when plants will be critical in addressing global challenges."

The historic Walled Garden is a green oasis of calm in the centre of Oxford, home to over 5,000 different types of plant from around the world. Seven display glasshouses contain plants from tropical rainforests, the world's largest water lilies, carnivorous plants, desert cacti, and alpine flora. We will be very fortunate to have experts showing us the range of plants.

We will meet inside the entrance to Oxford Botanic Garden beside the Danby Arch at 2pm. Please wear suitable shoes for some uneven ground, and bring a coat or umbrella if rain is forecast! The tour will last 60–90 minutes. Members may wish to go for a cup of tea, coffee, or other refreshments at the Garden's 'pop-up' café, run by Jericho Coffee Traders, after the tour.

#### Friday, 21 July 2023: VISIT TO DOBBIES GARDEN CENTRE, SIDDINGTON, FOR AFTERNOON TEA

How about a trip through rural Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire? We travel along the A40 to Burford and then join the scenic route through Aldsworth, Bibury, Barnsley to the outskirts of Cirencester and then on to Siddington, where we find Dobbies Garden Centre. We hope to arrive by 1pm to give you time to explore the Garden Centre where you can find everything you need for the garden (except the fairies to do the work!). I do not recommend buying 40 litre bags of compost! It is a large area which also has Sainsburys, Lakeland, Yankee Candles, clothes, food and books, jigsaws and toys. You will have time to wander around the site which is all on level ground.

The large restaurant area has been booked for Afternoon Tea at 2pm. Finger sandwiches on white and grain bread – egg mayonnaise & watercress, salmon, cream cheese & chive, cucumber & cream cheese, Wiltshire ham & mustard – followed by famous Dobbies scones served with Cornish clotted cream & jam, then scrumptious (their word) sweet treats, blackberry delice, fruit cream tart, carrot cake and mini macaroons all served at your table on a cake stand. A pot of tea or coffee, with free refills, completes the tea – there are plenty of toilets!

After tea you have time to catch up with your shopping. We will leave Dobbies at 3.30pm and come back a different route, via Fairford and Lechlade. We should be back in Oxford by 5pm (Botley Road permitting). I can personally vouch for the food – it has always been excellent.
