### **RENEWING YOUR OCNT MEMBERSHIP FROM 1 JANUARY 2024**

### Subscription increase for ALL members wishing to receive newsletters by post

Many thanks to our continuing loyal membership, and welcome to all our new members. This is to remind you that **your annual subscriptions will be due on 1 January 2024**, and to explain the new subscription rates for those who receive newsletters and booking forms by post rather than by email. There is *no subscription increase* for members who receive newsletters and booking forms by post rather than by email. The annual rate for this option will continue to be £10 (single) or £15 (joint membership).

### Important Information for members who wish to receive newsletters by post:

As we mentioned in the last newsletter, it was agreed at the AGM in March that annual subscription rates for members receiving newsletters and booking forms by post will increase by £5 to **£15 (single membership) or £20 (joint membership)**. This comes into effect from 1 January 2024. This price rise is to reflect the increased costs of printing and postage.

### Action required please:

- 1. If you would like to receive our newsletters and booking forms by post from January onwards, even if you're already receiving newsletters by post, please would you
  - i) *Let us know that this is your choice* by either emailing membership.ocnt@gmail.com or phoning 07444 100273, and
  - Arrange payment of the new amount e.g. *amending your Standing Order* if you already have one set up. If you pay by another method e.g. bank transfer or cheque, please *ensure you pay the revised amount (£15 single or £20 joint membership)*
- 2. If you have previously received newsletters and booking forms by post but would now like to receive them by email instead, please let us know by emailing <u>membership.ocnt@gmail.com</u> and confirming the email address you would like them to be sent to, and arranging your subscription payment as before.
- 3. If you have previously received newsletters and booking forms <u>by email</u> and are happy to continue to do so then you don't need to do anything other than arranging to pay your subscription at the start of January.

# Please note that from January onwards paper copies of the newsletters and any booking forms will only be posted to those who have paid the enhanced subscription rate.

Note that you can read the Newsletters on our website <u>Newsletters – OCNT (oxfordcnt.co.uk)</u> but booking forms are only sent directly to Members, never published online.

### How to pay your subscription

### **Our National Trust Neighbour – West Oxfordshire**

### Sarah Hannis, Senior Volunteering & Community Officer for West Oxfordshire writes:

As oak leaves and acorns fall, the West Oxfordshire team remains busy preparing for tree planting, planning for 2024 and, of course, Christmas.

Christmas is always a lovely time of year for National Trust properties. At **Coleshill**, there will be a Christmas Craft Fayre on Sunday, 26 November from 10am to 4pm. Meanwhile **Chastleton House** will be celebrating a 1960s Christmas. Visitors can discover a different Chastleton, a hive of activity, reminiscent of the parties hosted by Barbara and Alan Clutton-Brock in their heyday. This nostalgic approach last year had many visitors reminiscing with volunteers. Christmas opening at Chastleton is Wednesdays to Sundays, from 29 November to 17 December from 11am to 3pm, last entry at 2.15.

We have been actively **recruiting volunteers**. A new volunteer role for us is Walking volunteer. This is part of a National Trust programme to attract new audiences and introduce them to our beautiful countryside. Volunteer walk leaders will help community groups enjoy a nice, gentle walk without fear of getting lost.

Another role is for volunteers to scythe (yes, the centuries old skill of mowing) a specific area of the countryside. The National Trust along with Freshwater Habitats Trust are **managing a rare habitat of lowland alkaline fen.** This calcium rich, spring-fed water supply needs careful and continuous management. This area is extremely important for wildlife and often very rich in plant species. The fens also help by purifying water and creating wetland buffer zones to reduce flood risks in the surrounding land, as well as being excellent stores of carbon. We are currently in the restoration process of the project, involving scything and raking away the overgrown areas of reeds, reducing the nutrient levels of the fen to allow more diversity in plant species to come through. Why scything? Scything and raking is gentler and more effective for this work.



### **Walking Group News**

This year we have walked from Hughenden, Stowe, Buscot, Long Crendon, Waddesdon and Grey's Court. On each occasion there has been a short (2 miles or so) walk in the morning and a longer (4–6 mile) walk in the afternoon. Some come for just one of these, some for both.

Over the last three spring-to-autumn seasons we have visited most of the Trust properties within 40 or so minutes' drive of Oxford. Next year – starting in March and finishing in October, with a break during the usually hottest period – we will aim to complete the 'set'; and also perhaps repeat one or two of the early outings, such as the Ranger-led walk on White Horse Hill.

### Monday, 5 February 2024: VISIT TO WINDSOR

This trip has been arranged following many requests to visit the scene of recent events including the burial of Queen Elizabeth II and Philip, Duke of Edinburgh in addition to the marriage of Prince Harry. Although, at first sight, it seems to be expensive for a day trip, it should be remembered that you can use your ticket for free entrance to the Castle as many times as you like for one year if you get your ticket stamped when exiting the Castle.

The coach is not allowed to drop off passengers near the Castle entrance so it will drop us in the coach park in the town centre. Here it will be possible to do some shopping and have a snack or lunch before the visit to the Castle. The visit is booked to start at 1.15pm. It is a 10–15 minute walk mostly uphill from the coach park to the castle entrance. You have to pass through airport-style security before you are allowed in so ensure that you do not have anything in your bag which might be confiscated. You are advised to put keys, phones, cameras, coins etc in something (a bag or a coat) which can go through the x-ray machine separately from yourself. When you get in you can collect a free multimedia guide to help you follow the one-way route through the Castle precincts and St George's Chapel. There are about 10 flights of steps to negotiate during the tour ranging from 3 to 25 stairs in length. Most, but not quite all, have lifts which can be used by those with mobility problems. Some of these need to be operated by Castle Wardens who will be close by. At various places on the tour there are toilets and shops. There is a café for refreshments in the Undercroft.

### **Chester Holiday**



Thirty-seven of us ventured out on the holiday to Chester staying at the historic Queen at Chester Hotel where we enjoyed good food and comfortable rooms, mostly named after royalty (especially relatives of Queen Victoria) or well-known figures, such as Charles Dickens and Cecil Rhodes, who had stayed there in the past. One of our group even had the luxury of a four-poster bed!

Our visits took in a wide range of historic periods from the religious upheavals and persecutions of the 16<sup>th</sup> century (particularly highlighted at Baddesley Clinton, Speke Hall and Coughton Court) to the splendour of 17<sup>th</sup>-century Dunham Massey house and park, through to the Industrial Revolution with a visit to the cotton mill at Quarry Bank, and on to present-day Liverpool with a visit to Albert Dock and the glorious modern Roman Catholic Cathedral. Some of us also took time out to explore the many attractions of Chester including the Cathedral, the Rows, the city wall, and the zoo.

- Oxford Centre can and will continue to offer **Day Visits** as long as enough members can support them (note within these pages Nesta's proposal for a Lunch in January and Rupert's Booking Form to visit Windsor in February )
- Unless we hold **minimally 30 bookings with payment received** by the published booking deadline a Visit will be cancelled and payments returned (cancellation is a real disappointment to members who have booked and to everyone who has worked on all the detail of the day with us; the return of payments creates extra admin too)
- We are looking at ways to make **Bookings** more straightforward in future. For now, we no longer need to record **next of kin contact details** on your behalf but ask that when travelling with us you please keep these with you, in case they're needed
- We will <u>always</u> issue a printed ticket in confirmation of your booking which requires your sae (booking online suits some but not others and incurs costs in setting up a digital system – a situation which OCNT will always avoid, because our funds are channelled towards annual donations to the National Trust)

### A History of the National Trust

Our speaker, **David Simmonds**, describes his talk: Great oak trees grow from tiny acorns, and this is certainly true of the National Trust. From its humble beginnings in January 1895, the Trust has grown to have over five million members, more than 500 historic buildings, 780 miles of coast and close to 1,000 square miles of countryside. This talk considers how the National Trust has developed over the past 128 years, and suggests ways in which it might change in the future.

### The archaeology of Stowe Landscape Garden

Archaeologist **Dr Stephen Wass** has been engaged by the National Trust to carry out a variety of archaeological interventions across the park and gardens at Stowe over the past five years. The talk will give an account of these varied investigations and the light they shed on the long history of the site and the challenges that modern management of the gardens face.

# Tuesday, 19 March 2024, 11am at Magdalen College Auditorium, Longwall St, after the AGM at 10.45am The 'Asian Mystery': Benjamin Disraeli and the Poet in Politics

Benjamin Disraeli was the most unlikely prime minister of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. A Jew, a novelist and a failed poet, he rose to the leadership of the Tory Party while upturning all the social conventions of his day. Critics called him "the Asian mystery"; he himself boasted of having "an Oriental mind"; and his great rival, Gladstone, thought him a dictator in the making.



This talk by **Dr Robert Saunders**, Reader in British History at Queen Mary University of London, explores the life and career of one of Britain's most colourful and controversial prime ministers, assessing the origins of Disraeli's politics, his impact on the 19<sup>th</sup> century and his legacy for later generations.

### The challenge of funding our lectures at Magdalen College Auditorium

We are lucky to have such a pleasant well-equipped lecture theatre to hire at Magdalen, but we need an audience of at least 70 to cover the hire cost if each member pays £5 entrance. In 2019 our lecture audience was up to 80, but of course members have been anxious about attendance since Covid arrived among us. We have the option of raising the entrance fee at Magdalen to £7 per member in 2024 and/or holding more or all lectures via Zoom. What do you think we should do?
